This is as close to being polite as it gets. The *Cougar Ridge News* team has noticed that our neighborhood is getting sloppier about picking up after our pet pooches. To be sure, most of you are very faithful about following the rule about that, and we THANK YOU!!! However, for those who are grossed-out about the whole scoop-the-poop routine, please think about what effects it has on our beautiful, and well-tended neighborhood and our water system.



Close the Kiosk Gates <u>Gently</u>

How can we better protect our Mail Kiosk from outsiders? Several years ago we had a disturbing number of mail boxes compromised. The result of that was the installtion of the fencing around the Mail Kiosk and also the purchase of heavy duty mail boxes. However, if the gate is carelessly left open, it invites intruders, and possible vandalism. So please, when you pick up your mail, take a quick look around to make sure both gates are closed. In addition, see to it that all of the boxes are closed as well. If there is a problem with the gate closure, please contact one of the Board Members. (Their numbers are listed on the back of this insert to the *Cougar Ridge News* and also available on the Cougar Ridge website.) There are other ways we can help keep this area neat and tidy: pick up dropped paper clips, bulletin board pins, rubber bands etc. as you leave the Kiosk.

Thank You for Obeying This Rule!

We've written articles before about what the effects of leaving poop around does for the water system. It's about raw sewage going into our storm drains, and eventually entering the acquifer. We have our own well. Let's try to protect our water as best we can. Plus, there are these useful bags provided in several accessible areas in the neighborhood. Please use them and place your doggy waste in your garbage can when you get home.

Water System Final Round of Valve Replacement

Please Note: Valve Replacement to Involve Entire System Off-Line on November 8, 2023 Beginning at 9:00 AM.

WATER SYSTEM VALVE REPLACEMENTS - The Final Round

The final round of water system valve replacements will occur the week of November 6, 2023. Valve excavating will occur on Tuesday, November 7. <u>The entire system will be off-line on Wednesday,</u> <u>November 8, beginning at 9:00 AM</u>. The planned work requires draining the water storage tank. The system should be back in service by 4:00 PM. A <u>BOIL WATER ADVISORY</u> will be in place until satisfactory water samples are obtained.
