**Overgrown Area Near Mail Kiosk Receives Total Makeover** A new landscape possibility emerged as the Landscape Maintenance Committee volunteers uncovered a large depression between the Mail Kiosk and the Pump House. Landscape Maintenance Co-Chairs **Judy Lundgren** and **Barb Valinske** are working on replanting the area with native plants and trees, and turning the stumps into an eyecatching design. # Water System Improvements Insure Reliability

## Valve Replacement Project Continues

Our water distribution system valve replacement project continues as planned. In March, we replaced seven distribution valves along Rocky Mountain Drive and McLane Creek Court. We also excavated the assumed locale for one of our "missing" valves in the Rocky Mountain Drive cul-de-sac, yet there was no valve to be found. In fact, there was no water pipe found. So, the locator service missed their mark on that one. However, during the valve work we were able to determine a more reliable location of the valve and it will be replaced at a later date. Next year we will address valves on Capitol Forest Loop and the private drive.



With the valve replacement project well under way, seven more distribution valves were were replaced along Rocky Mountain Drive and McLane Creek Court.

Water Usage Projections Within Water Right

There are two homes in the neighborhood under construction and likely becoming water system users this year. That will leave three lots left to build on. Our water use projections, based on 2020 data, show us to be well within our water right of 63 acre-feet/year (20.5 million gallons/ year) when the neighborhood is built out. Helpful Neighbor Writes Program For Usage Reports Neighbor Steve Whitmire wrote an email program to be used for sending out the quarterly water usage reports. These reports were not sent in 2020 due to the time required for the previous method of assembling the reports. Steve's program is essentially a mail merge from days gone by and allows the reports to be sent out in minutes instead of hours.

**Increased Data Becomes Effective Evaluation Tool** The water meter data has proven to be a useful tool beyond just the state reporting requirements. With over three years of data on the books, we can easily evaluate trends and spot anomalies. Data review of individual household consumption has identified suspected leaks at two residences beyond the water meter. The homeowners were notified of the suspected leaks and the leaks were confirmed and repaired.

# **Playing In The Dirt**

Some Tips For Successful Gardening *Editor's Note:* If you're like me, I enjoy walking to the Postal Kiosk. As I check out the color and variety of plants in the islands, there's a lot to ooh and ahh along the way. Even though our two *landscape co-chairs are very busy with their latest* project, they were willing to share some pointers about what they've learned about what they call, "Playing in the dirt."

**Research Growing Conditions** 

First of all, evaluate the space you want to plant. Check to see what amount of water or rainfall this plant will need for optimal growing conditions. Most plants don't like to have "wet feet" because it promotes root rot, and may eventually cause its demise.

## **Roots Need Drainage**

Roots need oxygen, and if your soil is continuously wet, there are no air pockets for the roots to thrive. Many plants prefer a well-drained soil. Amend your soil with organic materials (such as compost) to improve the soil quality.

#### **Right Plant, Right Space**

Check the mature size of a tree or shrub you'd like to plant and measure the space where you want to put it. If, for example, you put a large plant in a small space, you'll most

Transplanting Container-Grown Perennials When putting perennials in the ground or repotting them in other containers, it is important to dig a hole that is twice as wide as the soil ball of the plant. This helps with root establishment. Use the same soil you dug out of the hole to fill in around your new plant instead of using bagged soil. Plant Watering Needs Vary

certainly need to spend time pruning it more often.

Most in-ground garden plants grow best with 1 or 2 inches of water per week. If not enough rain falls, water deeply once a week instead of watering lightly daily. Shallow water frequently only moistens the top layer of soil and encourages the plant's roots to move there instead of growing deeper.
